	Course Description	<p>This course will take you on a journey, asking who you are, and how we fit into an increasingly changing and sometimes confusing world. Within your own identities, there are significant shifts taking place in the world, that are changing the very meaning of what it means to be a citizen in a globalized world.</p> <p>Using the professor's specialisms in the fields of globalization (MA) and narrative education (EdD), and educational (MEd) you will explore the philosophies and theories, as well as the practical realities of how you fit into this changing world, and how our own values should not lose importance with the rapid advances in AI and technology.</p> <p>The professor will also bring in the journalistic approach as a reporter for K league websites, to connect the stories, and ethics within and how civic interests, particularly sports, demonstrate the clash between clash between identity with global interests and technological changes.</p> <p>Further, in this course you will develop your academic research & reading skills within the disciplines of the Humanities Social Sciences. During the class, you will apply your learning to discussions and dilemmas to develop your understanding of western philosophy within a globalisation context, before moving on to analyse and criticise key theories and concepts in citizenship and meaning in the age of AI and the 4th Industrial Revolution. By the end of the course, you will have demonstrated your understanding and knowledge of the key theories and be able to support your own ideas using a firm grounding in social science and philosophy concepts. You will also demonstrate your knowledge by creating online content to help build the understanding of others.</p>
