	Course Description	<p>This course explores South Korea's modern history, social transformation, and cultural anxieties through the lens of its cinema. Students will watch and critically engage with a curated selection of films spanning melodrama, crime thriller, horror, political drama, monster film, and transnational romance.</p> <p>Through daily screenings and structured discussion, students will examine how Korean filmmakers translate historical trauma, rapid modernization, class tension, nationalism, gender politics, and global ambition into cinematic language. Attention will be paid not only to narrative but also to form: framing, sound, pacing, genre conventions, and intertextual references.</p> <p>By the end of the course, students should understand Korean cinema not simply as a national product, but as a dynamic cultural discourse, one that negotiates memory, identity, and power in both local and global contexts.</p>

Evaluate representations of class, gender, and generational change Assess how films portray social mobility, gender, family structures, and youth culture within rapidly transforming Korean
